At the May meeting of the chapter (May 18, 2014), all chapter members will have the opportunity to vote for two members-at-large from the three candidates described below and on page 2. Nicholas Johns holds a Bachelor of Music degree in organ and piano performance from Georgia State University, where he was a University Scholar, played the piano with the GSU Symphonic Wind Ensemble, and sang with the University Singers. While at GSU, he studied organ with Sarah Martin and piano with Geoffrey Haydon, and was the recipient of the Tom Schneider Memorial Scholarship, the Atlanta AGO Scholarship, and the Atlanta Music Club Scholarship.

Nick is a first prize winner of dozens of annual competitions including the GMEA and GMTA All-State Piano and Chorus competitions, DMEA and DMTA piano competitions, and the Margaret A. Guthman piano competition. He has conducted orchestras for several musicals and also enjoys being a multi-intsrumentalist for many different genres of music. He currently serves as Organist/Choirmaster at Rock Spring Presbyterian Church in Atlanta and plays keyboards in the blues/rock band "Brother Hawk." Nick served in 2012-13 as the first appointed Student/Youth Representative to the Atlanta Chapter Board.



Dr. Jens Korndörfer grew up in southern Germany (where he studied church music), but has spent the past 12 years in France, Japan, Canada and the US – as a student at the Conservatories in Oberlin (Artist Diploma) and Paris (CNSM - Organ Diploma), McGill University in Montreal (D.Mus.), and as organist in residence at the Concert Hall Kitara in Sapporo, Japan. He states that his one-year tenure in Japan was the most formative experience in his life, and the beginning of his international concert and recording career (major venues in London, Paris, Berlin, Moscow, Tokyo, Hong Kong, Toronto, St. Louis and New York; and two solo CDs and one with the solo trumpet of the Sapporo Symphony Orchestra).

Since Sept. 2012, it has been his privilege to serve as full-time organist at First Presbyterian Church in Atlanta. He says, "What struck me most in Japan were the sold-out concert halls for organ concerts (with up to 2.000 seats...), thanks to amazing publicity and imaginative educational programs. I would love to explore some of these 'Japanese' paths in order to reach a greater public for the wonderful programs offered by the Atlanta chapter of the AGO."

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From the Dean

What wonderful programs we've had this late winter. Tamara Albrecht's workshop information and service, hosted by Cliff Frierson in their beautifully renovated space, were SO important for those of us who count our music-making as our profession. Watch for announcements about an upcoming workshop opportunity on the vital subjects of knowing yourself as musician, gaining skills in communication and learning steps to deal with conflict within the church workplace. I am seeing more and more examples of why we, as professionals, need these skills to avoid interpersonal and denominational land mines. We can help *ourselves* by becoming better at managing the *business* side of our careers!

Herb Buffington's improvisation class was equally important. We often self-depreciate our skills and talents to the point that we become afraid to explore and improvise. Herb's handout and demonstration provided much food for thought and practice in this art. Then, we were enveloped in beautiful demonstrations of his considerable talents and the capabilities of the church's two organs. The delicious reception afterward, while filling, did nothing to help slim the waistline for spring attire! Thanks to our Sub-dean Sue Mitchell-Wallace, for organizing these two offerings.

Two important matters require membership voting and approval at our May meeting. The first is the **election of our officers and atlarge members** for the next year. We have a fine slate nominated and you will find their bios elsewhere in this publication. Be sure to note the rules on page 9 of your directory governing write-in votes. **Voting will occur at the May meeting**. Plan to arrive a little before concert time to check in, receive a ballot and vote. The votes will be tallied during the program and the results announced during the chapter meeting, which will occur immediately after the concert. Officers will be installed at that time. We'll then move to the sanctuary to participate in the Evensong service.

The other matter requiring **chapter ratification** is a detailed revision of our **Chapter Operating Procedures**. The last major revision occurred in 2001, so it's high time we brought these written procedures up to date with how things are actually being run. Your board has carefully gone over these changes and has accepted them. Now comes your turn to vote. You may preview the procedures changes in one of two ways. First, a **Googlegroup announcement with attachment** will be sent out after the April newsletter is released. Open or download the document and look it over. Next, a **limited number of hard copies** will be available at the May meeting for you to look over if you have chosen not to be connected to the internet (and thus the Googlegroup). We will vote on acceptance of these changes during our chapter business meeting, which will be held after the concert and before Evensong.

The proposed changes more clearly define the roles of officers and committees. This document will be valuable as leadership changes hands. Once ratified by the chapter the document moves on to National and Regional officers for their approval. It is hoped the new document will be in place by July for the incoming dean to utilize.

Thank you in advance for attending this very important chapter meeting. We expect a delightful concert and meaningful Guild Service, followed by a delicious reception. I look forward to seeing YOU there!

Dr. Edwin Arthur Kraft, FAGO, Founder of Georgia Chapter

Edwin Arthur Kraft, born in New Haven, CT, studied music at Yale University under Horatio Parker before becoming the organist at St. Thomas Church in Brooklyn, NY. He then went to Europe for three years, studying organ with Grunecke in Berlin and Alexandre Guilmant and Charles-Marie Widor in Paris. In 1907 he was chosen from among 90 applicants as the organist of Trinity Cathedral, Cleveland. In 1914 he moved to Atlanta to work as municipal organist and founded the Georgia Chapter of the AGO that year, but he returned to Trinity Cathedral the following year and also served as head of the organ department at the Cleveland Institute of Music.





The First AGO Chapter in Georgia

On October 6, 1914, an organizational meeting was held at Cable Hall/Atlanta Conservatory of Music for the purpose of forming the first AGO chapter in the state. There were 14 charter members. The group then rested until October 13, at which time a second meeting was held for the purpose of filling out applications, paying dues, and negotiating a regular meeting date. The chapter's charter was issued on October 26. With organizational affairs behind, the Georgia Chapter got down to the business of planning programs on November 17. During the first year, the Georgia Chapter had a total membership of 33, including one fellow and one associate. Annual AGO dues were \$3.00, and a church dinner cost 50¢.

The following article appeared in *The Atlanta Constitution* on December 20, 1914, announcing the formation of the Georgia Chapter:

"At the instigation and under the direction of Dr. Edwin Arthur Kraft, organist of the City Auditorium, the Georgia Chapter of the American Guild of Organists has been organized in Atlanta. It has enrolled among its members the foremost organists of this city as well as prominent organists of Macon and Athens and numbers as honorary members some of Atlanta's leading clergymen and patrons of music.

Active membership under the American Guild of Organists, either as fellows or associates of the guild, certifies that certain severe examinations have been passed, which prove the successful applicants to be competent organists and directors, as well as scholarly musicians of high theoretical and practical attainment.

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The Atlanta [Georgia] chapter has been founded for the purpose of promoting a greater spirit of fellowship among Georgia organists, of raising the standards of their work, and arousing a greater interest in the calling among the members themselves as well as the public-at-large. It has evolved as its program for the season of 1914-1915 a series of organ recitals to be given in the various churches of the city by different members of the chapter."

Centennial Banquet - Monday, October 6, 2014



We will celebrate the organization of the Georgia Chapter of the American Guild of Organists with a gala evening on the exact date, one hundred years later. Atlanta First Presbyterian Church was chosen for this celebration because of its close association with the Georgia/Atlanta Chapter. Three of its former organists/directors have served as deans of the chapter: Dr. Charles A. Sheldon, Jr., AAGO (1921-23, 1932-34), Edith Howell Clark (1940-42, 1946-47), and The Rev. Herbert S. Archer, Jr. (1970-72).

The Black Tie Invited event will begin with Evening Prayer in Winship Chapel at 5:30, led by The Rev. Dr. Don E. Saliers, Our National Chaplain. Dr. Saliers is an American *theologian* specializing in *homiletics* and *liturgics*. An accomplished musician, theologian, and scholar of liturgics, and a United Methodist minister, Professor Saliers is the author of numerous books on the relationship between theology and worship practices. He co-authored *A Song to Sing, a Life to Live* with his daughter Emily Saliers, a member of the Indigo Girls. The *Centennial Hymn*, with text by former dean Michael Morgan, will be introduced at this service.

We will then gather for an hour of social time together, with heavy hors d'oeuvres and sparkling wine (nonalcoholic). Former dean Gregory Colson will entertain us with his talents on the grand piano, and there will be a multi-media chapter history presentation with slides from the *Centennial History Book*. A seated dinner will follow in Fifield Hall, with special anniversary cake, and with a dear friend of our chapter, a favorite guest recitalist, and former President of the AGO, Frederick Swann, as keynote speaker. It will surely be an affair to remember. The cost for this celebration will be \$40 per person (pre-paid). Note: there will be a choice of beef, chicken, or vegetarian entrées. Each member of the chapter will be receiving an invitation to this celebration with an RSVP return. For the 50th anniversary celebration in 1964, there were over 200 present. We are expecting a large turnout for this, so the earlier, the better. For those of you concerned about parking, there are 70 places behind the church, and there will be free parking, with security both in the garage and for crossing Peachtree Street.




Centennial Notecards

The history of these three major Atlanta churches not only contains their buildings and subsequent merger, but also their music ministry. This includes organs, professional double quartets and orchestras — in the early 20th century! The organ from one of these churches, installed in 1921, is still in existence as part of one of the largest pipe organs in northern Alabama. All three churches have always had a close association with the Georgia Chapter. AGO National Convention Silent Auction

The AGO National Council will sponsor a Silent Auction at the AGO National Convention in Boston in June 2014. The proceeds will benefit the Annual Fund, which covers the expenses of educational programs, Pipe Organ Encounters, professional certification programs, competitions, conventions, January Jubilees, and other costs of running the organization. The auction will be run online so that all AGO members and friends may participate, and not just those attending the national convention.

A number of members of the Council have already given items and services for the Silent Auction. These include two round-trip coach airfares to Europe, two expensive bottles of wine, workshops, and CD recordings. We would like to invite Chapters to promote the auction, including donation of items that might be interest to the AGO membership. This might include time share vacations, new scores and books, complimentary registration to a regional convention, a recital or workshop.

Donors will need to establish a reasonable value for each item and a recommended starting bid. For tangible items (books, CDs, artwork, rental equivalency of a time share week, concert tickets), the value should be tax deductible, but check with your tax professional. Unfortunately, services (lessons, a recital or workshop) are not tax deductible. The AGO will set a minimum starting bid where none is advised by the donor.

AGO Awarded \$15,000 Grant from the NEA

The AGO has been awarded a grant by the National Endowment for the Arts to support the 2014 AGO National Convention in Boston, MA, June 23–27, 2014. The \$15,000 NEA "Art Works" grant is directed to support performances, educational workshops, publication of the *Boston Organ Book*, and new music premieres. The grant carries a mandate that it be matched dollar for dollar from other funding sources. The 2014 AGO National Convention is the fifth consecutive AGO National Convention that has garnered funding from the arts endowment.

Art Works grants support the creation of art that meets the highest standards of excellence: public engagement with diverse and excellent art, lifelong learning in the arts, and enhancing the livability of communities through the arts. The NEA received 1,528 eligible Art Works applications, requesting more than \$75 million in funding. Of those applications, 895 are recommended for grants for a total of \$23.4 million.

The 2014 AGO National Convention will augment and enrich cultural life in New England and beyond through performances by outstanding solo artists and choral and instrumental ensembles in the city's concert halls and houses of worship, educational workshops, and presentations of scholarly papers. In addition, the Guild has commissioned 14 composers renowned for artistic excellence, totaling more than 100 minutes of new music.

Convention performers and performing ensembles include: James David Christie (organ) and the Boston Landmarks Orchestra, Christopher Wilkins (conductor); Joan Lippincott (organ) and the Boston Early Music Festival Chamber Ensemble; Handel and Haydn Society; Boston City Singers Youth Choir; Cantata Singers; Berklee Jazz Organ Group; Blue Heron Renaissance Choir; organists Chelsea Chen, Heinrich Christensen, Craig Cramer, Scott Dettra, Thierry Escaich, Janette Fishell, Peter Krasinski, Christian Lane, Renée Anne Louprette, Kimberly Marshall, Rosalind Mohnsen, Bruce Neswick, Jonathan Ortloff, Kola Owolabi, Pamela Ruiter-Feenstra, Jonathan Ryan, John Scott, Stephen Tharp, and Catherine Todorovski; Peter Sykes, harpsichord; plus winners of the AGO National Young Artists Competition in Organ Performance, the AGO National Competition in Organ Improvisation, and the AGO/Quimby Regional Competitions for Young Organists.

Premier performances will be presented of commissioned works from Carol Barnett, Lisa Bielawa, Carson Cooman, Pamela Decker, Libby Larsen, David Lasky, Matthew Martin, Nico Muhly, Betty Olivero, Scott Perkins, Robert Sirota, Hilary Tann, Edward Thompson, and James Woodman. Serving to highlight Boston's heritage of American musical composition, six historic compositions by Boston composers will be grouped with six new music commissions to form the *Boston Organ Book*, a publication to be distributed to all convention registrants to encourage performances for the benefit of the public.
