Join Us in Covington

This is an encouragement to each of you as an AGO Colleague, to make a special effort to attend the April 14th meeting in my hometown of Covington, a scenic city with a lot of Southern charm. Hosts Becky Ramsey and Alice Walker have worked hard to provide a very enjoyable experience for the members who are willing to make the short drive from the Atlanta metro area to Covington.

Becky is organist at the First Methodist Church, one of the local landmarks in town with its six Corinthian columns and unique steeple. The church was completed shortly before the Civil War, and served as a hospital for the wounded troops during the war. The interior boasts beautiful Victorian stained glass windows and a magnificent crystal chandelier. The 1975 Austin has recently been enlarged to three manuals and 36 ranks, and include a new Ancillary division, with several fully restored vintage ranks from 1923.

Alice is organist a few blocks away at the First Presbyterian Church. The original sanctuary of 1926 was the home in the 1930's of the Reverend Peter Marshall, the Scottish minister who went on to become a national figure as chaplain for the U.S. Senate. When a movie about his life, "A Man Called Peter," was filmed in 1955, scenes were shot in Covington, with the Methodist Church filling in for the Presbyterian Church. The handsome new sanctuary of 1995 has a lofty beamed ceiling, and a very fine 31-rank Wicks. It's a very complete two-manual instrument, and has a commanding Trompete-de-Fete, among other features.

A Message from The DEAN

This month's "Dean's Column" is coming to you live from a guest house computer in Edinburgh, Scotland (mainly because in the rush of getting everything together for the trip, I completely forgot to write it before leaving Atlanta). Today I'll visit that shrine of Presbyterianism - St. Gile's Church - and, if Scots Presbyterians light candles, I'll light one for each of you.

We organists are the only performers I know of who must alter the sounds of our instrument to convey the intent of the composer. A flute is a flute, a violin a violin, but an organ may be a dozen different flutes, a half-dozen strings, a variety of colorful reeds, a principal chorus, and any combination of the above. Some composers are general, and some very specific, in the tones they want to hear, and organists are governed by their instruments and their sense of "fidelity" to the composer's wishes in performing any given work.

This was especially obvious to me when I was turning pages for Dr. Kay McAfee's splendid recital of French Romantic organ music last month. Perhaps no composers are more specific in their requirements than were the French Romanticists, and as I followed the scores, it was very clear that Kay was being "religiously faithful" to the tonal intents of Widor, Vierne, Langlais, Messian, and the rest. Where they called for a 16 foot reed in the Swell, or a 4 foot flute in the pedal, Kay put them there. Even if she might rather have heard a string and celeste where the composer called for a Krummhorn and Gedeckt, she followed the instructions.

In one place especially this fidelity resounded loudly in my ears. Alain called for a solo in the low register with a tierce combination. Not so unusual, but the entire line lay below tenor C, where the Tierce on the organ at Central Presbyterian ends. Rather than be unfaithful, Kay doubled the solo line two octaves and a third above the notes to give the solo the color Alain intended. Would I have done that? How many of us would have bothered for the short phrase? But Kay did it!

I am always so impressed when I hear our Atlanta organists perform, and so grateful to be in a city where there are so many gifted church musicians, versatile organists, and wonderful instruments. We don't get to hear each other play for worship, because we're all in church at the same time. Every month there are special

programs, seasonal worship services outside of Sunday morning, evensongs and the like, when we can hear and appreciate our colleagues. Watch the calendar in your newsletter each month for opportunities to hear good music.

On that note, I'll close, and make my way to St. Giles' - I don't know how John Knox would respond to the wonderful Rieger organ in his church today -- but I know I will respond in a positive way, because when I hear the first note of the opening voluntary, I can appreciate what it took for the organist to get a place on the bench!

A special part of the day will be the tour of two ante-bellum homes in the historic district on Floyd Street. "Swanscombe", built in 1828, is the oldest home in the county, and has been beautifully restored by the current owners. It has not been on a tour in many years, and you will have a rare opportunity to see one of Covington's finest historic residences. Directly across the street is the Grahm-Simms-Ginn house, built in the 1830's. The current owner, a retired antiques dealer, has filled the space with many museum-quality pieces, and has created a Charleston style garden in the back. The two churches, both of the houses, and the Woman's Club (where a catered lunch will be served), are all within a block or two of the historic town square, which has many quaint shops and restaurants. Visitors can easily stroll from one venue to the next (although a shuttle bus will be provided), enjoying the azaleas and dogwoods that grace Covington in the spring. Becky and Alice will play a few selections at both churches, then have graciously turned over both instruments to the membership. I urge you to attend if you can – I'm sure you'll enjoy yourself!

More about Covington, Georgia

The City of Covington, located in Newton County 46 miles east of Atlanta, was originally a fertile and densely wooded hunting ground for the Creek Indian Nation. Named after a hero of the War of 1812, the city played an active part in the War Between the States. Fortunately, many plantation and town homes were spared by Sherman, and these lovely home and landmarks remain today, a proud part of the city's heritage. Antebellum and Greek Revival-style homes are beautiful reminders of the past, all occupied now as private residences.

Today, Covington has the vision of a twenty-first century city, which is an attractive site for new business and industry, and careful community planning. Covington is one of three cities in the nation to be fully acccredited in all areas of city government. Its Police Department is the recipient of the highest international award in the world, the Webber-Seavy Award. Becky Ramsey's husband, Sam, is serving his third term as Mayor of Covington.

And There Was Light

Covington First United Methodist Church houses a remarkable chandelier. It is larger than one of a similar design which hangs in the United States White House and weighs 1,100 pounds. The brass frame was manufactured in Spain. The crystal prisms and rope chains were made in Czechoslovakia and characteristically reflect primarily red, blue and gold light. The lead crystal ball which hangs from the bottom is irreplaceable.

This beautiful chandelier was originally a gift to Emory's Glenn Memorial UMC by Mrs. Flora Glenn Candler. It was later removed and in the '70's and then placed in the historic chapel of Oxford College. The weight began to cause damage to the chapel ceiling and walls and in the 1990's it was taken down and donated to Covington First UMC. It was dedicated to the Glory of God and in memory of Coe David Ramsey, Jr. and Mary Frances Cowen Ramsey by Sam and Becky Ramsey in 1992.

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

Leadership Program for Musicians in Atlanta 2007-2008 Classes begin August 11th

What is LPM? It is an excellent, proven music and worship development opportunity for all musicians and clergy. This curriculum is a cooperative project of the Episcopal Church USA, the Presbyterian Association of Musicians and the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. Classes are ten sessions per year over a two-year period, tailored to the students' needs. Courses are offered in a comprehensive, accessible study leading to the LPM Certificate in Church Music. Neil Alexander, David Brensinger, Joanne Brown, Sara Hawbecker, Brad Hughley, Sue Mitchell-Wallace, Michael Morgan and Bruce Neswick.

A History of Covington's FIRST PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

The First Presbyterian Church in Covington, Georgia, was first organized in 1827 and was located near the present site of the old Covington jail. That congregation dissolved in 1847. On March 28, 1877, with the Reverend J.N. Bradshaw serving as its first supply pastor, First Presbyterian Church was reorganized with twenty-one members. A dedication ceremony was conducted to consecrate the first building to the glory of God on October 6, 1878. The Reverend T.B. Trenholm was the first installed pastor of the church in 1893. In 1917 the first youth organization was begun with twenty-five members, and during the pastorate of Dr. Sam Burney Hay the first Vacation Bible School was held.

The original church was destroyed by fire in March of 1926, and a new sanctuary was rebuilt and dedicated during October of that same year. That sanctuary now contains church offices. The construction of a two-story building containing additional Sunday School rooms and the Martin Fellowship Hall was completed in May of 1959. In January of 1995, additional properties were purchased on Clark Street toward the west and the Clothes Closet, Food Pantry and Habitat for Humanity ministries were located there. On May 7, 1995, the present sanctuary and new church facilities were dedicated.

Through its history the church has been blessed and enriched by strong leadership, both lay and clergy. Our current pastor, the Reverend Dr. William B. Wade, Jr., is the twenty-fourth in a long line of ministers to serve this church, beginning his tenure here in January of 1986. Among our previous notable pastors are Sam B. Hay, Sr., who served from 1923 to 1926, and who later served as President of Stillman College, and Peter Marshall, who served here from 1930 to 1933, and later became Chaplain of the US Senate.

Today the church has over 350 members and active programs for members of all ages. Our music ministries are broad and deep, including choirs for toddlers, children, youth, adults, and senior adults, and a bell choir. We are blessed with a beautiful pipe organ that is a centerpiece of our worship space. Our Choir Director, Alan Bunn, is an accomplished singer and musician who also directs the choral music program at Heritage High School. Our Organist, Alice Walker, has an extensive background in church music and is also accredited by the AGO, with the CAGO, and the AAGO standards of excellence.

A History of Covington's FIRST UNITED METHODIST CHURCH

Covington First United Methodist Church is organized within the Atlanta-Decatur-Oxford District of the North Georgia Conference of the United Methodist Church. They evolved from the Yellow River Mission that was founded in the early 1800's to minister to the pioneers moving west of the Alcovy River. Their current building was erected around 1856-58 after the congregation outgrew its first two locations. It is described as one of the finest examples of Greek Revival architecture in existence today. Its classical full façade portico boasts six Corinthian columns topped by a balanced pediment. Its unique cupola was likely added sometime after the original construction, perhaps in the late 1880's.

In 1898-98 the ceiling was lowered and a new metal ceiling hung. The floors were inclined, new seats were installed and the first pipe organ purchased. The existing windows at the time wee replaced with colorful stained glass that highlights today's facility. These changes reflected the Victorian styles of the day.

In 1911, a Sunday School annex was added, providing a semicircular set of classrooms and a place for overflow crowds from the sanctuary. Most called it "the annex" but some called it "the beehive annex" because of its rounded design. In 1954, a new Sunday School annex including a parlor, kitchen and large fellowship hall was added. The building that houses the Preschool was purchased in 1970, and the Youth House was donated to the church in 1992.

No history of the church would be complete without mention of the people and times it has seen. It was used as a hospital for wounded during the Civil War. It has hosted fervent revivals led by some of the most notable preachers of the early church. It has inspired members to the ministry and missionary work. It continues to be a magnet and home for many leaving Atlanta and others drawn to the industries and rural lifestyle still possible in this area. It is today expanding its activities, classes and outreach to attract and minister to those who do not yet know the love of Christ in their lives.

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


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
