

The Atlanta AGO Library: Some Highlights

Many of our members probably don't know that our Chapter has a substantial library, with materials available for reference. The reason I am making that speculation is that in the fifteen-or-so years that I have served as Chapter Librarian, I have been asked only twice about the materials we might own.

As we move into the new year, I will be stepping down from my post, but was pleased when David Barber invited me to write a few words about what we have. I hope this will inspire one of you to offer to fill the position.

A number of members over the years have contributed books and scores to the collection, including reference materials, organ method books, liturgies and hymnals, back issues of *The American Organist*, orchestral works, and organ scores. To these folks we are indebted.

Just to highlight a few of the books:

- Organ Reference Books, including Corliss Richard Arnold's Organ Literature: A Comprehensive Survey; Philip Gehring's The Church Organ: A Guide to Its Selection; Jack Goode's Pipe Organ Registration; Hans Klotz's The Organ Handbook: Structure, Design, Maintenance, History, and Function of the Organ; Marilou Kratzenstein's Survey of Organ Literature and Editions; and William Leslie Sumner's The Organ: Its Evolution, Principles of Construction and Use.
- Organ Method Books: works by Clarence Dickinson, Richard Enright, Harold Gleason, Wilma Jensen, Gerhard Krapf, Wayne Leupold, and C. H. Trevor.
- Choral and Vocal Reference Books: Richard Anderson's Complete Handbook of Voice Training; Carl Bamberger's The
 Conductor's Art; James Day's The Literary Background to Bach's Cantatas; William Finn's The Art of the Choral Conductor;
 John Haberlen's Mastering Conducting Techniques; James McKinney's The Diagnosis and Correction of Vocal Faults; Omer
 Westendorf's Music Lessons for the Man in the Pew; and Harry Robert Wilson's Artistic Choral Singing.
- General Music History, Theory, and Reference: over a hundred volumes—just about every music textbook we had in college, no matter how old we are!
- Hymns and Hymnals: a few hymnbooks, but a larger number of histories and surveys of Christian hymnody.
- Music Philosophy and Aesthetics: Leonard Bernstein's The Joy of Music; and Walter Spalding's Music: An Art and a Language.
- Worship and Theology: AGO's Musician's Guide to the Denominations; Frank Burch Brown's Religious Aesthetics; Cynthia Pearl Maus's Christ and the Fine Arts; Erik Routley's Music Leadership in the Church; and Carl Schalk's The Pastor and the Church Musician: Thoughts on Aspects of a Common Ministry.
- Organ and Other Music Scores: a broad spectrum of music from the earliest compositions to scarce 20th century pieces, and even a few manuscripts, along with first printings of some Elgar, Guilmant, Reger, and even a few Widor symphonies!



The Church Music Institute's eLibrary

The Choral Director's Best Friend

It's very easy for church musicians to get stuck in the rut of a cycle of choral music. Even if we do a three-year rotation of pieces in deference to the usual lectionary cycle (Years A, B, C), is there really only one piece suited to each position in the service? How might a typical selection process for choral music proceed?

- Personal memory—which might not be that reliable. (If it wasn't a feast day, would you expect to remember what was sung for each liturgical point in any prior year?)
- The church choral library: A listing by title or composer from the locally "cataloged" library, no matter how well it is prepared, probably doesn't give liturgical, scriptural, or theological references; and may have been stocked by persons with little or no knowledge about what should be there!
- Service leaflets going back only as far as you, your institution, or predecessor has kept.

In order not to stay in a cycle from the past or to find something that supports a particular scripture or topic, it may be necessary to

- Search liturgical resources of individual publishers that would recall an existing title in your library
- Search online recommendations of denominations, often not comprehensive and prepared by a variety of people with differing criteria
- Search print indexes which are out of date

The eLibrary can be used as a search mechanism for one's own library: think of having direct-hit searches for all of your choral planning! While we may have enough repertoire in our own choral collections, large or small, we rarely have the kind of cataloging necessary to find all the possibilities of anthems for any given Sunday in our own library. The CMI eLibrary provides that.

Not the Choral Director? The eLibrary Is Still Your Good Friend!

If you are an organist who accompanies choral music selected by someone else, you can use this enormous resource for locating accompaniments which might be printed, transcribed or arranged better for use at the organ. How many times have you been handed a bad piano reduction that actually hides the original instrumentation, or is a poor second to the composer's original (likely out of print) and now "improved" by someone in a new publication of the original? The eLibrary is a big help for locating the existence of alternative editions.

Another useful resource is the search capability to find choral music based on hymn tunes for use in leading or accompanying congregational singing at the organ. Concertato arrangements of hymns will have creative introductions, accompaniments, and festive harmonizations. For example, one can use material from the Vaughan Williams setting of "Old Hundredth" as an interlude to the doxology and the last verse of that anthem as accompaniment for the singing in a festive service. Most people may know about this particular anthem, but there are many other settings of familiar and frequently used hymn tunes in the eLibrary that would save us from repetition of our favorite "treatments" or taking the time to create our own in a very busy season. (Over 600 options are available in the eLibrary using the Advanced Search, under "Additional Choir," and choosing "Congregation." Adding the hymn tune in the Advanced Search will yield the specific arrangements sought.)

Most church musicians earn their keep (and often longevity in their positions) by providing the "exactly right" music for every service. Granted, a major portion of that task is reliant on our ability to gauge the culture, preferences, knowledge and appreciation of congregations we serve. But having resources like the CMI eLibrary shortens the path to the necessary information we need and increases our options to make the best possible selections.

How Is Music Chosen for the CMI eLibrary?

The purpose of CMI's Library of anthems and service music is twofold:

- To provide sacred music for effective worship that represents the best of its genre
- To create an archive of sacred music from many stylistic periods for use and study

In addition to the uniqueness of this project, the materials in the Library reflect a **noncommercial** intent. This means all major publishers of sacred music are represented in the collection.

The Library began with a collection of anthems from a Dallas church that offered their choral library to CMI. Since that time, many churches nationwide have given copies of music from their choral libraries to be included in the Library. In addition, professional church musicians have given private collections of anthems gathered from years of experience, seminaries have donated anthems from their choral libraries, and publishers send new anthems twice a year to be reviewed for inclusion in the Library.

An ongoing set of criteria for the selection of music for the Library was established by the professional staff of CMI at the start of the project, as described below. When a question arises concerning an anthem meeting the guidelines, evaluation by multiple staff members determines the outcome. Every anthem placed in the Library is vetted and deemed suitable for an effective worship experience.

About Text

An anthem's evaluation begins with the text. Some texts selected for inclusion use direct quotations from scripture. All texts must convey sound theological and Biblical truths. Texts must be of high quality: intellectually instructive yet heart-warming and capable of raising the listener to a higher level of spiritual understanding. Vapid, trite, sentimentally repetitive texts do not enrich faith. While gender-neutral language is preferred, texts from historic periods that do not comply are not excluded on this point alone.

About Music

The musical setting of the text should be equally high in worth, imagination, and compositional skill on the part of the composer. Anthems demonstrating musical clichés and multiple repetitions of simplified melodic and rhythmic patterns are avoided. Continuous modulations in multiple stanzas of hymn settings, for example, are considered ineffective musical creativity. Pieces worthy of inclusion demonstrate a strong marriage of text and music and are congruent in mood, theological and Biblical intent, and strength of purpose. The musical setting must raise the text to a higher level than just reading the text alone. If spiritual formation in the church is indebted to hymns sung by congregations, which is generally considered a high value for hymn singing, the same is also true about anthems sung in worship.

The Overall Collection

Anthems in the CMI Library collection are historically and stylistically eclectic. Masses, motets, anthems, spirituals, carols, and more from the 15th century to the present day make up the content of the Library. Most texts are in English, while original non-English texts often have English translations. Anthems from the late 19th century American repertoire (and others) are perhaps not as appropriate for worship now as when they were introduced. These anthems could also include those of a patriotic nature that provide music for special needs in the church. It is believed these pieces are an essential part of the development of the church anthem and should be included as part of the archival content of the Library.



- 1. Include "Atlanta AGO" in the subject line to easily identify this as not being SPAM.
- 2. Include ALL pertinent information regarding date, time, and location of your event in the posting. Attaching a poster won't do, as some folks can't or won't open attachments. (Note: Portable Format Document [PDF] format is highly recommended if you do wish to attach a flyer or poster.)
- 3. Limit yourself to one posting per event.
- 4. Please, no personal business ads or postings for friends or other institutions are allowed. We have a paid option for business ads, and posting ads for other churches negates the benefits of being a paid chapter member. Job postings may be forwarded to Pam Ingram for inclusion on the website and in *The Organizer*, which are the appropriate settings for such listings.


Regarding replies to requests by members (such as for music, a last-minute replacement, or other related types of information), we include an additional reminder:
