Chaplain's Corner



On October 30 I said my prayers in the Hagia Sofia in Istanbul, Turkey, the massive and magnificent cathedral church commissioned by the Roman Emperor Constantine the Great and completed by the Emperor Justinian in 537 AD, who declared, "Solomon, I have outdone thee!"

This magnificent Byzantine domed basilica stood as the largest church in Christendom for almost 1,000 years before being sacked by the Ottoman Turks and converted into a mosque in 1453. The bells, altar, iconostasis, and sacrificial vessels and other relics were removed and the mosaics depicting Jesus, His Mother Mary, Christian saints and angels were also removed or plastered over. Islamic features – such as the mihrab, minbar, and four minarets – were added. The Hagia Sofia served as a mosque until it was converted into a museum in 1935.


The Church was dedicated to the Hagia Sofia, Greek words meaning The Wisdom of God, the Logos, the second person of the Holy Trinity. In antiquity, its patronal feast took place on December 25, the commemoration of the Birth of the

Incarnate Wisdom of God, Christ the Messiah.

The Hagia Sofia is the only place of worship with which I am familiar where mosaics of the orthodox Christian faith and medallions of the Islamic faith coexist. I was delighted to enter from the narthex to the nave through the Imperial Gate under a mosaic of the enthroned Lord Jesus. I was even more delighted to see the enor-

mous mosaic of the Virgin Mary and the Child Jesus flanked by St. Peter and St. Paul reigning high and

lifted up over the two Islamic medallions representing Allah and the Prophet Mohammad.



roof of the church with the floor, symbolically uniting heaven and earth. The Mother of God, hovering between heaven and earth, serves as "the heavenly ladder, whereby God has descended and as the Bridge leading those on earth to heaven."

Simply stated, the Orthodox communion symbolically stresses the hope found in the Incarnation. God becomes one of us that we might become like God. And a close look at the apse mosaic shows the Virgin Mary pointing to Jesus as the Way, the hope

that finds ultimate fulfillment in His death and resurrection.

Soon we enter into the season of divine hope. Whether we serve Hebrew congregations celebrating the hope of God's divine provision at Hanukkah and the hope of the longed-for Messiah, or whether we serve Christian congregations who claim God's divine hope has come to us in Emmanuel, we are agents of hope – rabbis, priests, pastors, cantors, organists, choirmasters, choristers alike. But in order to share hope, we must first experience hope.

My fervent prayer for you, my AGO ministry colleagues, is for an abundance of divine hope in your souls this season. The stresses of congregational life – planning, rehearsing, managing challenging personalities, fundraising – can take a toll on the servant of God. That is why I pray for you!

As I write, I am claiming the words of Martin Luther:

From heaven above to earth I come To bear good news to every home; Glad tidings of great joy I bring, Whereof I now will say and sing: This is the Christ, our God and Lord, Who in all need shall aid afford; He will Himself your Savior be From all your sins to set you free. He will on you the gifts bestow Prepared by God for all below, That in His kingdom, bright and fair, You may with us His glory share."

May the Lord God Almighty grant you His saving aid, His divine gifts, and a full measure of His glory that divine hope may shine through you and your artistic gift in this happy and hectic season.

From the Dean

I'll be honest. I dislike the gym. Hate is probably too strong a word, but even that thought creeps in at times. Also, past memories of having to "dress out," embarrassing sports failures and a general lack of coordination early on established that exercise was bad. Now, the challenge of having to get up early, get dressed, eat, drive, warm up, work out, cool down, drive home and recuperate makes me literally want to throw in the towel at times! Yet, I know the end results will benefit me years down the road. So, I make myself go regularly and try to appreciate the increased energy, strength, flexibility and slimmer waist.

We can draw some parallels to the guild and our organ-related jobs from this illustration. Attending guild meetings, workshops and programs is often a challenge. Past experiences with the guild may leave us cold. Leaving a day job (yes, most of us are working 9-5 jobs in addition to church jobs), taking care of family matters, driving to east Egypt in our notorious rush hour traffic all make us want to stay home. Yet, we know attendance at our meetings will feed our musical soul, provide us with new friendships and support, and give our minds fresh ideas and challenges. Sometimes we should just make ourselves go to guild and then be happily rewarded when we find it was worth the effort to get there.

Personal practice time can also be challenging. Choosing sight-readable service literature is taking the easy way out. Everyone needs to do it now and then, but a steady diet of that will weaken our playing skills and bore our listeners. We also shortchange God, to whom we should be offering our very best. Working on a challenging piece makes us plan and work ahead while stretching our skills. One of the rewards is advancement to the next level of playing. We all have heard the saying that if you're not moving forward, you're falling behind. There is, unfortunately, no static position in keeping your keyboard playing skills up to par.

Mary faced challenges as she bore Christ. I can't imagine having to travel by donkey to visit relatives of a soon-to-be-husband and deal with registering to pay taxes in what was probably an unfamiliar town. Can you imagine the gossip and rumors she endured, not to mention the rough donkey ride. Then, she had to give birth in an animal cave. Only the sure knowledge of what she was fulfilling could have given her the perseverance to carry out God's request of her. She accepted her challenge not only willingly, but with great joy. How many of us would sing songs of praise in such circumstances?

I can't imagine going to the gym or practicing every time with great joy, but perhaps I can try to do that more often as a New Year's resolution. As we approach the celebration of the birth of Christ, let us face our own challenges, big and small, with joy, dedication and a drive to better our skills and our chapter. If we do, chapter membership and attendance could break all records in 2014. Remember, we want to widen the circle, and what better way to do that than with joy in our hearts? People want to be with other happy, joyful folk, and we can certainly offer that!

From your officers and board members, we wish each of you a joyous and memorable Advent and Christmas season. I look forward to seeing you in 2014.

Early Chapter Recitals

During the first and second years, the Georgia Chapter scheduled monthly recitals by chapter members. These recitals were the backbone of chapter activities for many years.


The first recital under the auspices of the Georgia Chapter was given by Miss Eda Bartholomew, a charter member of the chapter, on December 15, 1914, at St. Mark's M.E. Church. A graduate of the Royal Conservatory of Leipzig, Miss Bartholomew was remembered as one of the Georgia Chapter's finest performers. In Atlanta, she was on the faculty at Washington Seminary and Agnes Scott College, in addition to having her own private organ school.



[Note: During our centennial program year, we will celebrate the centennial of this recital with a recital on the same date, at the same location, of this first recital at St. Mark United Methodist Church. This will be followed with our chapter's annual Christmas celebration.]

The "serious music" of early Georgia Chapter recitals, given by chapter members, consisted of organ works still in the standard repertory, works by living organists whose compositions are now obscure, and transcriptions of popular orchestral scores. The satisfying surprise in examining early programs is the substantial number of major organ works.

Christmas at "Briarcliff"



Perhaps, one of the most outstanding meetings in the history of the Georgia Chapter was held on December 13, 1932 at "Briarcliff," the magnificent mansion of Mr. and Mrs. Asa G. Candler, Jr. The opportunity of being guests of these splendid Atlantans brought a record attendance of chapter members, their escorts, and some specially invited guests. After a short business meeting and Christmas dinner, the guests assembled in the music room for discussions about the Aeolian organ, followed by a recital given by several chapter members.

sized Aeolian organ installed in the music room was the largest privately owned organ in Georgia at the time and the 8th largest that Aeolian had ever built for a private residence.

Georgia/Atlanta Chapter Facts

In 1922, THE ATLANTA JOURNAL's radio station, WSB, inaugurated the first regularly broadcast service in the south when it put the service from First Presbyterian Church on the air. A year later, listeners at a wedding at the residence of Samuel M. Inman heard the massive tones of an organ burst forth unannounced, while an assemblage of guests at the wedding listened in amazement to music that could not possibly originate in the home, but was perfect for the wedding ceremony they were about to wit-

ness. The music was relayed by WSB engineers from First Presbyterian Church, where Dr. Charles Sheldon, organist, was seated at the great Pilcher organ. The stringed orchestra at the home blended its music with the organ at the marriage ceremony. Dr. Sheldon served for many years as the official organist for both ATLANTA JOURNAL WSB and ATLANTA CONSTITUTION WGM radio stations.
