When I was a teenager, my family moved back to our "home" church in Tennessee to worship with my grandmother and the rest of our family. It was (and still is) a loving community where people supported each other and weren't afraid to have youth lead many parts of worship.

We had an ancient organ and an organist who tried her best, but it was fairly painful to sing the familiar hymns. Therefore, as a teenager, I told everyone that I hated the organ! And I did...the one that I heard, wheezing its best, week after week.

When I went to seminary in my early 20s, I remember sitting in the all-brick chapel and letting the sound of THAT organ wash over me. Wait a minute... now I LOVED the organ! My favorite piece from that time was the toccata on O Morning Star, which I asked our organist (and my friend) to play at my wedding as the postlude.

From not even knowing what a toccata was to having it be my favorite piece was a huge testament to the power of both a beautiful instrument and inspired players, and I will always be grateful for that gift. When an organist uses his or her gifts to teach and make gorgeous music. God is always glorified.

Centennial Hymn

In June of 2013, Sue Mitchell-Wallace, FAGO, Sub-Dean of the Atlanta Chapter, American Guild of Organists, approached me with the idea of writing a new hymn in celebration of the 100th anniversary of our Chapter, to be celebrated in 2014.

The Atlanta Chapter has enjoyed a rich and colorful history over the last century – the sounds of exemplary instruments of both American and European builders; the talents of the finest international performers; the gifts of local organists and church music scholars; and the fellowship of colleagues devoted to the art of organ playing and appreciation of music in worship.

To put that heritage into words that we could sing together was an honor and a challenge for me, and a request to which I could not say "no" without a sense of betrayal for what some forty years of membership in the Chapter have meant to me.

As Sue and I talked, we shared ideas which, being organists, have inspired us over the years, and over the next few days I sought to express them in metrical form. These included:

- our vocation as musicians to rejoice in the glory of God;
- the way organs echo not just our songs, but our living and breathing;
- the gifts of music to crown us with joy, and lift us out of despair:
- our call among our congregations and ourselves to teach and learn;
- our conviction to lead faithful worshipers to "a more profound alleluia"; and
- the presence of music in our churches, our minds, and our hearts.

A richness of images requires a lot of words, so I opted for setting the text in Long Meter (8.8.8.8.), which provides the most syllables to the widest selection of hymn tunes. By doing this, the hymn could be sung in a variety of traditions and circumstances with familiarity and propriety.

My first choice for a tune which most of us can sing from memory is John Hatton's immortal "Duke Street." I especially like the way the melody ascends as we sing the words, "Lift high your voice."

The old Genevan tune for Psalm 134, known to us from the first English collection of Psalms as "Old Hundredth," suits the text well, and brings together our past and future as church musicians in a special way.

Both of these tunes lend themselves to unison or harmonized singing, and to our creative introductions and accompaniments as we celebrate who we are, and what we are called to do.

Monetary awards from these auditions have aided students in furthering their organ studies, purchasing scores and books, or attending a summer workshop.

AGO National Headquarters Announces New Scholarship Opportunities

The Ronald G. Pogorzelski and Lester D. Yankee Memorial Organ Scholarship is intended to support the education of talented young organists who will make significant contributions to the fields of organ playing and sacred music. They are expected to have existing talent and achievements in the field of organ playing and an expressed commitment post-graduation to teaching, performing, sacred music, or other serious endeavor with respect to the organ.

The Pogorzelski-Yankee Memorial Organ Scholarship will be awarded for a period of up to four (4) years for undergraduate applicants and up to two (2) years for graduate school applicants. Awards for the initial year of the scholarship (to be awarded for study in the 2014-2015 academic year) will be as follows:

- Four (4) undergraduate awards of \$7,500 each year
- Two (2) graduate student awards of \$15,000 each year
