Through the years artists, benefactors, political and religious leaders – Marian Anderson, Wynton Marsalis, John D. Rockefeller, Bishop Desmond Tutu, Angela Davis, Marian Wright Edelman, Toni Morrison, Alex Haley, and Martin Luther King, Jr. among others – have appeared on her podium.

The Holtkamp organ, Opus 1827, was installed in 1968, and was played for the first time by Dr. Joyce Johnson, our host tonight, while the body of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. lay in state before his funeral.

A Message from The DEAN

Living where I do, in the most southwest corner of Fulton County, and driving

every day to Central Presbyterian Church in downtown Atlanta and Columbia Seminary in Decatur, I spend a lot of time in the car. All of that time spent behind the wheel is accompanied by my constant companion – the car radio. I try to find a balance among classical music to soothe and inspire, talk shows to stretch my patience, and Christian broadcasting to keep me aware of how other people profess their faith, and how I confess my own beliefs.

Some of this examination underscores what is part of my own credo; some of it causes me to question and confirm my own relationship with God and you; and occasionally something I hear will prompt a bit of editing in my personal "Book of Common Prayer." Undoubtedly, all

of it touches me where I am comfortable, and stretches me where I need to grow.

The Christmas season is probably the most lucrative in all of these characteristics. How well I remember, back in mid-October as I drove up to Bristol, Tennessee to present a couple of lectures and do a program for their AGO Chapter, hearing a local pastor advertising their annual "Halloween Hallelujah Drive-Through Nativity!"

The other day my "companion" was an anonymous preacher who was talking about our obsession with Christmas "presents" – those things we give and receive during the holidays which, for the most part, are enjoyed and often put aside and forgotten. As he spoke, he gradually made the subtle shift from "presents" to "presence" – the gift of God-among-us.

The sermon was well-seasoned with clichés like "the reason for the season," but I could not forget his wonderful use of the homonyms.

My hope for all of us is that during this busy and rich time of the church year, we will remember the "presents"

- the opportunity for worship leaders, organists, choir members, bell ringers, instrumentalists, the young and the old, to share their gifts of time and talent and faith with their congregations
- the composers and artists who give us the sounds and sights which inspire our worship, the love of family, friends, and congregations
- the remembrance of promises and prophecies, the confidence of fulfillment and faithfulness, the hope, peace, love, and joy that live among and beyond us.

Maybe "reason for the season" isn't so trite after all!


