Samuel Metzger was born in Rochester, NY, but from an early age grew up in northern Arizona where his father was a missionary to the Navajo Indians. Early studies were at Northern Arizona State University in Flagstaff, where he was accepted into the Preparatory School of Music as a student of Dr. Marilyn Brandon. In high school he studied with Dr. Royce Johnson at the University of Arizona, Tucson.

Mr. Metzger began undergraduate studies in 1990 at Arizona State University where he was a student of Robert Clark. There he studied on a Regents Scholarship and at graduation was named "Most Outstanding Undergraduate in Performance." In 1995 he was awarded a Fulbright Scholarship and began studies with Jon Laukvik at the Hochschule für Musik und Darstellende Kunst in Stuttgart, Germany. He was awarded a second Fulbright Scholarship and in 1997 graduated with a degree of Künstleriches Aufbaustudium (KA). Mr. Metzger then went on to study with Marie-Claire Alain in St. Germain-en-Laye, France.

In January 2003, Mr. Metzger became Senior Organist at Coral Ridge Presbyterian Church, Fort Lauderdale, FL. Services were televised on the Coral Ridge Hour, a program that was broadcast throughout the USA and internationally to 202 countries.

Samuel is currently the Director of Music and Organist at Second Presbyterian Church in Memphis, TN. Mr. Metzger is heard regularly around the country in concert. He has recorded seven CDs; more information may be found at metzgermusic.com.





Guest Dinner Policy Change

(reprinted from October Newsletter)

Dear Colleagues,

I have some exciting news regarding our upcoming program year. The Atlanta Chapter is one of the largest in the AGO. Other chapters look to us as a "standard" for their own organization, programming, and chapter life. We need to realize our influence and the impact our chapter has on the Guild as a whole.

We are serious about reaching out to organists, church musicians, and others who love the organ and appreciate excellence in music. We also want to foster new talent and encourage young musicians, especially organists, to pursue their goals and excel in musicianship. We want to grow our chapter!

The Executive Board met at the conclusion of the '16-'17 program year in regular session to conduct chapter business and discuss ways to encourage growth of the chapter. One of the issues brought to the board was the need for individual members to reach out to other organists and musicians and increase attendance at our monthly programs. Our Sub-Dean, Becky Ramsey, has put together an outstanding program for the upcoming season. It is packed with incredible artists and outstanding venues. We also looked at the cost of meals and the desire of many to bring guests, but who also feel the "pinch" of the pocketbook. In order to promote increased attendance and welcome more potential members, the Board has voted to allow members in good standing to bring a potential member to our dinner meeting "on us." We want to comp the cost of the meal of your guest in order to promote the growth of the chapter. This would be a one-time occurrence for that guest. To take advantage of this member benefit when you make your dinner reservation for a given program, give the name of your guest, state that you are bringing a first-time guest who is a potential member, and request that he or she be a "guest of the Guild." We request that you also provide the guest's email address or other contact information so our membership team can follow up with that potential member.

If you have any questions regarding this new policy, please let me know. In short – bring a guest/potential member to dinner; the Chapter will comp the cost of his/her meal one time; and we will follow up with that guest regarding joining the Guild. We want to be deliberate in our efforts to grow our chapter.

From the Chapter Liaison for the 2020 Convention

(reprinted from the November Newsletter)

Dear members and friends.

At the time of this writing (mid-October 2017), the 2020 National Convention is 994 days away. That's a long way off, right? By then, you may have given up "organ-ing" altogether to become a blueberry farmer in Pomfret, Connecticut!

But here's the reality: it is happening now. The celebration that the convention constitutes is a culmination of relationships and activities. Most events in our lives follow this pattern, as enactments of great plans and preparations. Likewise, a performance of a piece of music is the product of a complex collaboration between composer, performer, instrument builder, venue provider, social conveyor which allows for and facilitates art-making at all, audience, and popcorn vendor. Conventions resemble that complexity, only more so.

I'm sure we have all been to events such as these where we enjoyed some things but were dissatisfied by others. Maybe we voiced our approbation somewhat but voiced our complaints even louder. In candor, I know that I am guilty of being the voice of complaint more than the voice of participation or positivity. We all want this convention to be great—we live and work here. And if it's between complaining or being complained about, I choose the latter.

What about you? Are you ready to go beyond "wanting" a great convention in your city? And while your vision may not be 20/20 (wink) as to what that greatness might resemble, let me offer one more argument in support of helping out: we are all outsiders, and we are all insiders. I am a Jew in a largely Christian (or implicitly Christian) organization, and I came to the organ very late in life, comparatively. Outsider, right? But I am from Atlanta, and all I really know how to do is play, teach, and think about music. Therefore, I am very much "inside" this community and needful of its collegiality and support. There are myriad ways I could expand on these etic and emic notions.

Does this resonate with you? What is your story, and in what ways do you wish the Guild could support your passions? In what ways do you wish you could support or guide others? In what ways does a convention like this matter? If you care about these questions and have some ideas, then you have a voice, and we want to hear it.

The 2020 Steering Committee is working creatively and fairly constantly to provide this chapter, this national Guild, and this community with a convention to remember.

Robert Warren Rylander January 22, 1948-November 11, 2017

Robert Warren Rylander, age 69, passed away in his home in Suwanee, GA on November 11, 2017.

He was born in Minneapolis, MN, on January 22, 1948.



Following his service in the Army at Ft. Gordon, GA, he moved permanently to the Atlanta area. He was an employee of Equifax for thirty years.

He was an accomplished organist and choir director, touching and inspiring many lives with his musicianship. A longtime member of the American Guild of Organists, Bob will leave a legacy that advances the art of liturgical

organ music. He served at Corpus Christi Catholic Church in Stone Mountain, GA, from 1978 through the early 1990s. He moved on to Cross and Crown Lutheran Church in Atlanta, and finally served at McKendree United Methodist Church in Lawrenceville, GA.

He is preceded in death by his parents, Howard and Lorraine Rylander and his partner of 26 years, Sam Cangelose III.

Bob is survived by his brother Jim Rylander and wife Mary Jo; and their children Martha Kennedy (married to Shawn and expecting baby Thomas), Brendan (married to Laura and has daughter Josephine), Nathan (newly married to Meghan), and Jonathan.

A memorial service celebrating the music, fellowship, and hospitality that was Bob was held at Johns Creek United Methodist Church, 11180 Medlock Bridge Road, Johns Creek, GA 30097 on December 9, 2017 at 11:00 a.m.

Furman University Church Music Conference to Feature Organ Recital with Nigel Potts

The Furman University Department of Music will host its 2018 Church Music Conference on campus Thursday and Friday, Jan. 25 and 26, with guest clinicians Donald McCullough and Nola Reed Knouse. The conference also features an organ concert Thursday, Jan. 25 at 8 p.m. in Daniel Memorial Chapel by organist Nigel Potts with soprano Sarah Rose Taylor.

Hosted by Furman music faculty members Charles Tompkins and Hugh Ferguson Floyd, the 2018 Church Music Conference runs Thursday, Jan. 25 at 1 p.m. through 4:30 p.m. Friday, Jan. 26. Registration for the conference is \$75 on or before Jan. 6, and \$95 after that date as space remains. Registration for full-time students is \$40. Fees include two days of conference sessions, the Thursday evening organ recital, a conference music packet and a Friday luncheon.

Tickets for the Nigel Potts and Sarah Rose Taylor recital, part of Furman's Sound Quality Concert Series/Hartness Organ Series, are \$15 for adults, \$10 for seniors, and \$5 for students/youth. Church Music Conference attendees receive free admission to this recital.

For the Church Music Conference, clinician Donald McCullough, noted choral conductor, composer and church musician, will present sessions on vocal/choral and rehearsal techniques. Clinician Nola Reed Knouse, president of The Moravian Music Foundation, will lecture on the Moravian sacred music tradition. Both clinicians will lead choral reading sessions. Nigel Potts, organist and master of the choristers at Grace Cathedral (Episcopal) in Charleston, SC, will perform a recital on Furman's C.B. Fisk organ. Potts' wife and acclaimed soprano Sarah Rose Taylor will join the program for a performance of Edward Elgar's song cycle "Sea Pictures."

Founded in 1971, the Furman University Church Music Conference is made possible through an endowment from the Thomson Foundation as a memorial to Waddy Randolph Thomson and Pauline Blackwell Thomson. Each year, distinguished musicians of national prominence present sessions on subjects related to the study and practice of church music.
