

Annual Chapter Scholarship Auditions

Our Annual Chapter Scholarship Auditions were held at Decatur First United Methodist Church on Friday, May 8. Judges were Charles Higgs, Mitch Weisiger, and Tim Young. It was a full day, with ten applicants playing. Awards worth \$6,000 were distributed as follows:

- Joseph D'Amico, an adult student of Tim Wissler, was awarded \$500 to continue organ lessons and to purchase scores.
- Vicki Ward Frey, an adult student of Tom Alderman, was awarded \$250 to continue organ lessons and to purchase scores.
- **Timothy Jones**, a student of Jack Mitchener at Mercer Univ., will be a freshman at that institution this fall. He will use his \$1,000 award toward college expenses.
- Elizabeth Lamberth, an adult student of Jens Korndörfer, was awarded \$250 to continue organ lessons.
- **Yinying Luo**, a graduate student of Paul Jacobs at Juilliard, was awarded \$1,000 towards tuition, plus the \$500 Founder's Prize, established in 2014 to commemorate the Centennial Anniversary of our Chapter. Yinying maintains her membership in our Chapter.
- Nathan Peace, a rising high school senior and student of Tom Alderman, was awarded \$400 to continue organ lessons and to purchase scores.
- Nikolai Peek, newly graduated from Piedmont College where he studied with James Mellichamp, was awarded \$600 toward tuition at Indiana University where he will enter the Master's program as a student of Janette Fishell.
- Craig Soaries, a graduate student of Jack Mitchener at Mercer, was awarded \$300 toward college tuition.
- Marie Stauffer, a freshman at Georgia Tech studying privately with Jens Korndörfer, was awarded \$200 to continue organ lessons.
- Geneva Stonecipher, a rising senior at the University of Georgia studying with David Burton-Brown, is the first recipient of the annual Sandra Hardage Bunn Memorial Organ Scholarship. The \$1,000 award will be used for college tuition.

Sub-Dean's Corner

The Greek philosopher Heraclitus said, "Change is the only constant." His observation rings true over 2,000 years later. Whether in the world of business, manufacturing, education, or even music, one thing we can count on is change. Reflecting on the past decade or so, consider how much the music ministry has been impacted by technology. For better or for worse, we are fully immersed in the 21st century and need to embrace rather than resist the future. Face it, nobody likes change. We like things to remain the way they have always been. We like the "status quo." We want things to be comfortable. And, after all, change is uncomfortable.


World-renowned change expert and Harvard Business school professor John Kotter suggests that in order to implement change powerfully and successfully, there has to be a strategic vision and a sense of urgency. I think we have both! The purpose of our guild is to advance the cause of organ and choral music, to increase their contributions to aesthetic and religious experiences and to promote their understanding, appreciation and enjoyment. Sunday after Sunday we stand before congregations large and small with the purpose of bringing glory to God through "religious experiences" enriched by the majesty and power of the organ, and filled with beautiful, resonant choral music. So what, you may ask, is the vision and the urgent need?

I'm glad you asked. The vision is simple: Our chapter plans to host the 2020 National AGO Convention. But there is more to it than just the manpower, logistics, and hard work of hosting a convention. We're talking 2020....we are well into the 21st century. This convention must address a rapidly changing, technology-rich culture and a church that is caught in the throes of that change and technology. As church musicians we are on the "front lines" where the action is. Our convention must showcase the finest organists, outstanding instruments, and so much more. Musicians will travel from all over the country to Atlanta for more than just a "convention experience." They will be coming with high expectations and difficult questions....questions for which they need answers because these will directly impact their respective roles back home. We have such an awesome responsibility! So, the vision for 2020 is to have more than your average, run-of-the-mill national convention!

The urgent need is not as simple. While we have begun the "brainstorming" and initial stages of planning, we need to tap resources that to this point have gone somewhat undisturbed. Actually, these are "new" untapped resources. Our Guild is at an important crossroads. We are surrounded by young, capable, talented musicians, many of whom are leaning toward the "King of Instruments." We need to not only make every effort to draw young people into the Guild, we also need to engage them in the planning process for 2020. I believe we will be impressed with the fresh insight and innovative ideas of our younger counterparts. Thank you for the efforts you are making to bring young musicians into the Guild and help them get established in the world of organ and choral music.

So, as you can see, change is definitely coming. We're on the brink of exciting days. Innovative, fresh, new ideas are needed at every turn. We've embarked on a journey that will take us all the way to 2020 and a truly outstanding National AGO Convention. Hang on for a great ride!

Taylor Organ Competition — April 18, 2015

On April 18, the chapter hosted the Taylor Organ Competition at All Saints' Episcopal Church. Five young organists participated in this competition. Judges Alan Morrison, Joan Lippincott, and Christopher Young awarded first place to **Nicholas Capozzoli** and second place to **Alcee Chriss**. Both are students of James David Christie at Oberlin Conservatory of Music. Nicholas will perform a winner's recital in Atlanta in October.

The Taylor Competition is made possible due to a generous bequest of long-time Atlanta chapter member Elizabeth Abbott Taylor (1904-2005). The competition takes place every three years to benefit talented young musicians. First place is awarded \$10,000 and a recital in Atlanta and second place is awarded \$5,000. The next Taylor Organ Competition will be held in 2018, open to students from throughout the United States.

Cherry Rhodes & Ladd Thomas Honored by the AGO

The AGO presented its 12th annual Endowment Fund Distinguished Artist Award Recital and Gala Benefit Reception, this year honoring Cherry Rhodes and Ladd Thomas, on Friday, April 17, at the First United Methodist Church of Glendale, CA, where Dr. Thomas has served as organist for 55 years. An audience of more than 500 colleagues, students, friends, and loved ones came together to celebrate the lifetime achievements of this dynamic musical couple.

The Gala was sponsored by the AGO National Council and its Development Committee in cooperation with the First United Methodist Church of Glendale. The event raised approximately \$60,000 to be invested in the AGO Endowment Fund in the couple's honor. Annual earnings from the Endowment support the educational activities of the Guild.

The honorees performed a recital that included Mendelssohn's Sonata No. 1 in F Minor (Thomas), Mussorgsky's Pictures at an Exhibition, transcribed by Jean Guillou (Rhodes), and combined their talents on the organ bench in a rare organ duet performance of The Sorcerer's Apprentice by Dukas, as arranged by Rayner Brown for their exclusive use. The Gala Benefit Reception followed at the Hilton Los Angeles North/Glendale Hotel with 200 guests in attendance.

AGO President John Walker, FAGO, presented the honorees with the AGO Endowment Fund Distinguished Artist Award "for their exemplary careers as stellar performers and passionate teachers, and their lifelong service to the AGO and the sacred music profession."

Established in 1994, the AGO Endowment Fund provides income to educate new organists and to cultivate new audiences for organ and choral music. Tax-deductible contributions to the Endowment Fund are invested in perpetuity to produce continuing income for essential Guild programs and educational projects. The AGO's annual Gala travels around the country to celebrate distinguished members of the organ world. Past AGO Gala honorees have included Marie-Claire Alain (New York City), Charles Callahan (St. Louis), David Craighead (Philadelphia), Gerre and Judith Hancock (New York City), Joyce Jones (Fort Worth), Marilyn Keiser (New York City), Marilyn Mason (Ann Arbor), Thomas Murray (New Haven), John Obetz (Kansas City), Frederick Swann (Los Angeles), and John and Marianne Weaver (Philadelphia).


