Adam Ward serves as Director of Music Ministries at Providence United Methodist Church in Charlotte, NC. He leads a multi-faceted music ministry that includes four staff, ten choirs and countless volunteers. Outside of the church, Adam is a sought-after accompanist and clinician in both sacred and secular settings.

Receiving the Doctor of Musical Arts, Master of Music, and Bachelor of Music degrees in Organ Performance from the University of North Carolina at Greensboro, Adam also studied piano, harpsichord, voice and choral conducting at the University. During his time at UNC-G, he accompanied the University Chorale, the University Men's Glee Club, and was an adjunct lecturer in organ.



Ward is the Immediate Past Dean of the Charlotte Chapter of the American Guild of Organists and he has also served the Guild as the District Convener for North Carolina. His recording "For the Beauty of the Earth" has been featured on the nationally-syndicated radio broadcast PipeDreams. He has performed throughout the Eastern United States as well as multiple performances in the United Kingdom and Italy.

From the Dean

There is a lot to be said for rearing children in a musical family. Nancy and I were thrilled as we watched our children excel in piano, trumpet, flute, violin, and even guitar. It broke our hearts when they put their instruments "on the shelf" as young adults. We're now heartened when we see glimmers of that musical influence from time to time. Our daughter sitting at my piano playing from her favorite Jim Brickman books, and our older son playing "Linus and Lucy" on an old upright piano as one of his buddies danced in a video clip at his graduation from firefighter's school, encourage us that the music still lives on!

Of late my attention has been directed to the 500th anniversary of the Reformation and its influence on our mutual passion: music. It is interesting to note that the great reformer, Martin Luther, was brought up in a musical family. He sang in a boys' choir and became proficient playing the flute. In addition for being known as the stalwart reformer who fearlessly nailed the Ninety-Five Theses on the Wittenberg Church door, his belief in salvation by faith alone, and his passion that Scripture should be translated into the language of the people, Luther is also celebrated for the birth of congregational singing in the church. He longed for people to be able to sing God's praise in their own language in worship.


In a brief bio of Luther on the website of the Center for Church Music (<u>www.songsandhymns.org</u>) I found a stirring quote from his writings that I think is worth sharing:

Next to the word of God, the noble art of music is the greatest treasure in the world. It controls our hearts, minds, and spirits. A person who does not regard music as a marvelous creation of God does not deserve to be called a human being; he should be permitted to hear nothing but the braying of asses and the grunting of hogs.

Whoa! Not sure I would ever be quite so brash, but I have to admire his passion for music that led to his writing of several hymns and to publishing hymnals for congregational singing. He encouraged parents to sing the hymns at home with their children, and parochial schools to teach them to their students. Luther was also "instrumental" in creating new music for church choirs, organ, and other instruments, with the help of skilled musicians. Quite a musical legacy!

We are now the torchbearers of Luther's musical battle cry to impassion the lives of others with dynamic, meaningful, rich music. What a glorious privilege and awesome responsibility! I am grateful to be part of a community that shares this "task unfinished." That reference was to the hymn by Frank Houghton, "Facing A Task Unfinished" (1931), which was a response to the desperate need of the China Inland Mission for 200 new workers to meet the need of sharing the Gospel with a lost and dying world. Today we have a need, perhaps not quite so dramatic, to build the kingdom of God through music and to enhance the world around us with "the greatest treasure in the world" next to the word of God: music! Thank you for all you do in this ongoing endeavor. Have a blessed Lent and Easter season!

Joan Lippincott To Be Honored by National AGO

The National AGO has selected internationally acclaimed organist and teacher **Joan Lippincott** as the honoree for the 2017 AGO Endowment Fund Distinguished Artist Award Recital and Gala Benefit Reception on Friday, April 21, 2017, in Princeton, NJ. Complete information can be found online at <u>Agohq.org/2017-gala</u>.

The celebration will begin at 7:00 p.m. at Princeton University Chapel, where the honoree, joined by organists Scott Dettra and Eric Plutz, will play a recital that is free and open to the public. A Gala Benefit Reception (advance tickets required) will follow at Prospect House, the private dining club of Princeton University.

Joan Lippincott has been acclaimed as one of America's outstanding organ virtuosos. She is *professor emerita* of organ at Westminster Choir College of Rider University and was principal university organist at Princeton University from 1993 to 2000. Her many recordings on the Gothic label include music of Bach, Duruflé, Mozart, Mendelssohn, Widor, Alain, and Pinkham. Lippincott's most recent CD is J.S. Bach: Orgelbüchlein, recorded on the Fritts organ at Princeton Theological Seminary.

The Executive Board of the Atlanta Chapter met prior to the wonderful recital of Yinying Luo at Lutheran Church of the Redeemer on Tuesday, February 14, 2017. Of the several items covered on our agenda, three are noteworthy:

- The Atlanta Chapter will host the AGO National Convention on July 5-9, 2020. Co-chairs Scott Atchison and John Brandt are building an
 outstanding team to plan and execute a remarkable experience for the AGO.
- Our new website will be launched soon. Jennifer Waggoner and Jessica Scott (Cosmic Lagoon Design) met with the board to finalize the
 last details before the new website goes live.
- The Nomination Committee, chaired by immediate past dean Sue Mitchell-Wallace, submitted the following slate of candidates for the election to replace the two members rotating off the board in May: Joyce Johnson, Jens Korndoerfer, Matt McMahan, and Peter Waggoner. The April issue of *The Organizer* will include bios and pictures of the candidates. The election will take place at our May dinner/meeting at the Cathedral of St. Philip. We thank Ariel Merivil and Keith Williamson for their three years of service on the Board.

National AGO Awarded \$25,000 from NEA


The National AGO has been awarded a grant by the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA) to support educational programs and career development for organists, choral conductors, and composers in 2017, including new music commissioned for the AGO National Convention in Kansas City, MO, July 2–6, 2018. While the AGO has received regular support from the NEA since 2005, the \$25,000 "Art Works" award is the largest grant the arts endowment has ever given to the Guild.

"This grant covers the full breadth of the AGO's educational activities for current and prospective members as well as our programs of outreach to the public," stated AGO Executive Director James Thomashower. "The NEA's funding sends an uplifting message to the entire organ community: our instrument and its music are vitally important to the American people. The award validates the AGO's ongoing efforts to ensure that music for the organ is created by talented composers, performed by skilled musicians, and appreciated by the widest audience possible. It is an honor for the Guild to be recognized by the NEA, the most prestigious independent federal agency in the United States responsible for funding and promoting artistic excellence, creativity, and innovation."

In December, the NEA announced that it will award more than \$30 million to nonprofit organizations and individuals across the country in 2017. Nearly \$26 million of that will be for Art Works, the NEA's largest funding category. Art Works focuses on the creation of art that meets the highest standards of excellence, public engagement with diverse and excellent art, lifelong learning in the arts, and the strengthening of communities through the arts. The NEA will give 970 Art Works grants to organizations in 48 states, the District of Columbia, and the U.S. Virgin Islands in 2017.

"The arts are for all of us, and by supporting these projects, the National Endowment for the Arts is providing more opportunities for the public to engage with the arts," said NEA Chairman Jane Chu. "Whether in a theater, a town square, a museum, or a hospital, the arts are everywhere and make our lives richer."


