## About the Recitalist



**Erik William Suter**, a native of Chicago, is a musician of international acclaim. For nearly 10 years, he served as Organist at Washington National Cathedral in Washington, DC. He holds degrees from Oberlin Conservatory and Yale University, where he studied with Haskell Thomson and Thomas Murray respectively.

Previously, he held positions at Trinity Church, Copley Square, and at the Parish of All Saints, both in Boston; and at Trinity Church-on-the-Green in New Haven, CT.

Mr. Suter has performed extensively throughout the United States and Canada, as well as many Asian and European countries. He has performed at national conventions of the American Guild of Organists and the Organ Historical Society. As a continuo artist, he has appeared with The Philadelphia Orchestra and National Symphony Orchestra. From 2003 until 2007, Mr. Suter was under the exclusive concert management of Karen McFarlane Artists, Inc.

Mr. Suter won first prize in the 1993 Chicago American Guild of Organists Young Organist's Competition; first prize in the 1995 National Undergraduate Organ Competition in Iowa; the Gold Medal of the Mayor of Musashino/Tokyo in the 1996 International Organ Competition in Japan; and first prize in the 1997 Yale Biennial Organ Competition. He was a two-time finalist in the prestigious AGO National Young Artists Competition in Organ Playing. Mr. Suter has been featured numerous times on the nationally syndicated American Public Media show Pipedreams. His recordings, including five solo compact discs, can be found on the JAV Recordings, Gothic and Pro Organo labels.

Mr. Suter is a commercial pilot and flight instructor. Based at Washington National Airport, he is a pilot at Air Wisconsin Airlines Corporation where he flies the Canadair Regional Jet for US Airways Express. He lives in Gaithersburg, MD, with his wife and son.



Façade design for new 4-manual, 50-rank pipe organ, including two 2-manual console in adjacent chapels.




Tallowood Baptist Church in Houston, Texas

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## From the Dean

Change. Reinvent. Amend. All these words express the idea of taking what is (or has been) and creating something new. Change is certainly evident in the beauty of nature during the fall season. Warm colors race forward that were once masked by cool green pigment. Colder nights foreshadow winter's icy breath. Ah, how I LOVE the fall.

Change is certainly evident in our National organizations' guiding structure. Officers and elected officials are taking on additional responsibilities and our Regional Councilors are now in charge of newly redrawn regions. Dues will be collected electronically next year, and even the national website has received a makeover. Take some time to familiarize yourself with this streamlined guiding force.

On the local level we have begun a new Google Group and Calendar to facilitate communication. Our open Facebook page now has over 200 members, over half of whom are not chapter members. Think of all of the potential in this unaffiliated group! Monthly meeting schedules and concerts will become increasingly diverse to accommodate participation by more members. Our web site will also be undergoing changes to help simplify information.

What changes do you face in your work? New pastors, directors or choir members? A new or rebuilt instrument? A new congregation to serve? Retirement time? If you play regularly for a congregation, do you occasionally look at your weekly routine and consider ways to freshen things up? Play a lighter prelude rather than something serious and dark? Offer a quieter postlude so that folk can greet each other without having to compete with full organ? Vary your hymn registrations so that you don't always use the same 3 or 4 generals for every hymn? Select a choral anthem that challenges and inspires both singer and listener? Begin a new level of guild certification? Attend a concert at a location outside your local area? Step outside your regular routines and try something new!

Some folks greet change with open arms, relishing new ideas and fresh approaches with abandon. Others run the opposite direction, preferring the known and the safe. There is a middle ground which accepts the inevitability of change, embraces that which refreshes and honors the foundation upon which the new is built. The wise person will take this middle position, trusting that great discoveries await an adventurous spirit. We can also be certainly be thankful for that which has come before, appreciating that one day we too will be considered a 'forbearer', and our way of doing things will eventually be changed.

As our yearly cycle draws toward a close and we pause to give thanks later this month, let's take a moment to gratefully remember our chapter forbearers and the great foundation upon which our presentday chapter thrives. In your church work, learn the past upon which you stand, and consider the legacy you will leave. Give thanks for the positive in every situation and learn to change things for the better where you can assert influence. Then, take a break, let the silence of winter incubate new thoughts so that with the surety of winter passed, you will emerge ready to embrace the newness of spring.

I wish for each of you a season of change, thankfulness and time surrounded by those you love. I look forward to seeing YOU at our November chapter meal and program.

# **POEA Report**

The highlight of my summer was spending a week in Rochester, NY, at the Pipe Organ Encounter Advanced at the Eastman School of Music. It was a privilege to be a part of such a fantastic event and to hear and play some of the finest organs in the United States. Each day consisted of a class with a different topic every day, private lessons, practice time, a visit to see a local organ, and a faculty recital. I was honored to have private lessons with two teachers that had spent time in Atlanta. Bruce Neswick, currently serving at Indiana University, and Dr. Robert Poovey, organist and music director at St. Paul's Episcopal in Rochester. They were incredibly knowledgeable and educated, as well as very encouraging and complimentary. They were not the only great faculty there, however. Nathan Laube, newly appointed Eastman Organ Department faculty member, along with David Higgs, Eastman Organ Department Chair, Dr. Charles Tompkins, Professor of Organ at Furman University, and Atlanta's own Dr. Nicole Marane, Associate Organist at Peachtree Road United Methodist Church, were there as well.

The main thing that I brought home from this experience was not only a renewed passion for the organ, but relationships with teachers and students that will last far longer than just that one week. We all continue to keep in touch through Facebook, phone calls, and text messages. I thoroughly enjoyed my time with the other students, and it was a blessing to get to talk to other teenagers that enjoy the same things I do. Much to my surprise, however, we did not sit around and only talk about music and the organ. We talked about movies, sports, and told a lot of jokes! Each night, we all went down to the game room in the basement of the dorms and played pranks on each other, told stories, and laughed at anything anyone did. Then, when curfew came, we went to our separate rooms and got on Skype to talk even more, and then eventually fell asleep in our stuffy, non-airconditioned, 90-degree rooms, only to wake up 6 hours later to start it all over again!

This POEA truly was the most incredible experience of my life and I strongly encourage all organ students to consider attending. I also encourage all teachers to recommend it to all of their students. Financial assistance is available, so there is no excuse! Trust me, it is an experience that you or your student will never forget.



### **Georgia/Atlanta Chapter Facts**

Musicians who wished to substitute in Atlanta area churches had to first meet and audition for Miss M. Ethel Beyer, organist-director at Druid Hills Methodist Church (50 years) and charter member of the Georgia Chapter, before they could be recommended to chapter members.

P.T. Barnum and the world famous Swedish opera soprano Jenny Lind participated in a "great fair" sponsored by First Baptist Church to help raise money to rebuild the sanctuary after it was burned during Sherman's march through Atlanta. According to documentation, a two-manual organ of unknown origin was installed in the sanctuary (1869-70?) – Both building and organ debt free!



### Georgia/Atlanta Chapter AGO History

### Atlanta's First Independent Organ School

#### Need Organ Lessons? Call IVY 3159

The following article appeared in THE ATLANTA CONSTITUTION on May 15, 1912, announcing the first session of Miss Eda E. Bartholomew's Organ School at the Harris Street Presbyterian Church.



"... Miss Bartholomew is well-known as an organist and teacher. Following a four-year course at the Royal Conservatory of Leipzig, Germany, graduating in organ and piano, she became director of the organ department at Brenau College Conservatory, Gainesville, Georgia, in addition to serving on the faculty at Agnes Scott College, Decatur, Georgia, and organist/director of the First M.E. Church, Atlanta,. At present, she is a member of the music faculty at Washington Seminary and organist/director of St. Mark M.E. Church. In addition to her current duties, this new venture will be entirely independent, and the only school of its kind in the city. Her recitals are artistic features of the city's musical life.



Harris Street Presbyterian

"A thoroughly modern, up-to-date three-manual organ has been installed by the H. Hall & Co. Organ Builders of New Haven, Conn. The organ has electric-pneumatic action throughout and is equipped with all mechanical accessories and designed according to the standard of the American Guild of Organists and cost several thousand dollars. The location will be convenient to students from any part of the city, and the organ will be one more valuable acquisition to the

collection of fine instruments already installed in Atlanta churches. The church will have use of the instrument for their religious services in return for Miss Bartholomew's use of the auditorium for the placing of the organ. Another interesting detail of the contract is that while Miss Bartholomew will provide organists for the church services from among her pupils, they will at the same time secure valuable experience in the conduct of church services and the gaining of self-confidence.

"Students wishing to complete the study of organ must be well-advanced in piano. Two years of study constitute the course of study with a post-graduate course for those desiring to do concert work."


In 1924, the decision was made to move Harris Street Presbyterian to quieter surroundings "far out of town, away

beyond the creek." Harris Street Church became the first of the downtown churches to sell its property. The proceeds went to build Covenant Presbyterian as it stands today. With the closing of Harris Street Presbyterian, Miss Bartholomew's pipe organ was moved to Westminster Presbyterian Church, where she continued her Organ School until her marriage and subsequent move to Florida in 1948.

# Around the Chapter

### All Saints' Day Service of Remembrance

A day commemorating the faithfully departed saints of God



Several Atlanta Chapter members have been directors of this group, which is today one of the oldest and most widely recognized independent choral groups in the United States.
