Ben van Oosten (born 1955) in the Hague, Netherlands is an organist, professor and author. He gave his first organ recital in 1970 at the age of 15 and was soon thereafter accepted at the prestigious Sweelinck Conservatory in Amsterdam where he studied organ with Albert de Klerk and piano with Berthe Davelaar. Van Oosten graduated *cum laude* in 1979 with a diploma in organ solo.

He completed advanced studies in Paris, France with André Isoir and Daniel Roth Whether by geographical influence or artistic choice, he gravitated toward the French Romantic Organ school of the 19th Century that had its origins in the new Symphonic organs of Aristide Cavaillé-Coll. Van Oosten subsequently became one of the greatest practitioners and interpreters of organ works from that era. Among his recordings are the complete works of Charles-Marie Widor, the complete works of Louis Vierne, the eight sonatas of Alexandre Guilamnt and the organ works of Jacques-Nicolas Lemmens and Louis James Alfred Lefébure-Wély. He has also undertaken a recording of the complete works of Marcel Dupré.

Besides maintaining a heavy recital schedule and an active private teaching practice, he serves as organist for Grote Kerk (Hague) and is a Professor of Music at Rotterdam Conservatory in the Netherlands. He has also written a biography of Widor and his works, *Vater der Orgelsymphonie*.

Among the honors and awards he has received are the *Preis der deutschen Schallplattenkritik* and the *Diapason d' Orgue*. In 1998, the French government awarded him the honorary rank of *Chavalier dans l'Ordre des Arts et des Lettres* for his efforts in reviving the French Romantic tradition

A MESSAGE FROM THE DEAN ~ New Beginnings!

Isn't it remarkable how quickly summer passes by? In May of each year I am excited at the prospect of having three months to enjoy at an easier pace although my work at the college still continues. 

Region III Convention Held in Hampton Roads, Virginia, July 5-8

I was fortunate to have attended "Hit the Stops," hosted by the Tidewater Chapter in the Hampton Roads area of Virginia last month. The entire convention was thoroughly planned, well-executed, and educational. Concert highlights included a program by the Virginia Children's Chorus, held at Ohef Shalom Temple, a Reform congregation in Norfolk; a performance of Daniel In Babylon, by Francis Jackson, a monodrama with music; a recital by Peggy Haas Howell exquisitely played on a Mander instrument (II/27) (my "fave" of all the organs I heard), located in St. Paul's Episcopal Church, Norfolk; and Alan Morrison's outstanding closing recital (Casavant/Orgues Letourneau, III/79), held at Christ & St. Luke's Church, Norfolk. There were several notable commissions for this convention, including the premiere of Wayne Wold's Partita On Down Ampney for two organists, played by Janette

Fishell and Colin Andrews, and <u>Variations on a Theme</u> of <u>Ludwig Diehn</u>, by Mary Beth Bennett, premiered by Alan during his closing program. A trip to historic Williamsburg took us back in time as we were treated to a candlelight concert in Bruton Parish Church.

The convention afforded me time to reconnect with some of my friends and colleagues from Region III, and to hear many pleasantries about Atlanta and our Chapter when folks noticed my nametag. If you've never attended a Regional Convention outside of ours, I heartily recommend it. It's a great time to make new acquaintances and to experience a different part of the country!




