John Paul Cappa was born in Wheeling, WV and raised in Pittsburgh, PA. He became interested in the organ late as a child. At the age of nine, John Paul took lessons with the local church organist where he took the organ more seriously after getting free tickets to a Virgil Fox Community Concert and seeing Mr. Fox perform. He studied choral conducting and organ at Grove City College for his BM. In 1986 he studied with the late Robert Cornelison, earned his Masters in Choral Conducting, Organ and Liturgy at the University of Notre Dame. in 1988 he began studying with renown Bach interpreter Craig Cramer and recently received his DMA in organ performance at West Virginia University. In 2005 he studied with William Haller. John Paul has spent summers abroad, 1989 in England, 1995 in Paris and Germany in 1999 and 2000 where he studied the organs of Henry Willis, Cavaille-Coll, and Schnitger and Silbermann. In 1992 and 2000 he took choirs on choral tours to Italy culminating in concerts at St. Ignatio in Rome, Milan and Florence, singing for an audience with the late Pope John Paul II.

While in Erie, PA he directed the music program at St. George Church, taught as adjunct music faculty at Gannon University and Mercyhurst College, and hosted a weekly radio program at WQLN-FM 91.3 called "Music of Faith." John Paul enjoyed restoring two beautiful victorian homes, one from 1871 (the original family homestead of the Felgemaker's, an early organ builder in victorian Erie) and another from 1882 also in Erie. While in Pittsburgh he directed the music program at Our Lady of Grace Church where he had a children's choir of 60 and a children's orchestra of 27 who performed selections from the Vivaldi "Gloria" and Handel's "Messiah" as well as Bach's "Christmas Oratorio." He also has written articles for the GIA Quarterly on using "the Organ with Contemporary Ensembles," as well as articles for National Pastoral Music. He is presently music director at St. Mark Evangelical Catholic Church in Tampa, Florida and teaches "Gregorian Chant" at St. Leo University. Cappa is currently enrolled in the choral conducting DMA program at the University of Southern Florida as a student of Dr. Richard Zelinski.

### Ruminations and Idle Thoughts about our Universe


A few weeks ago I started to tidy up my office at the college. It's an annual event to mark the end of the summer and the beginning of another year. As in years past, I had accumulated an enormous pile of music, magazines, and the like which needed to be filed away. So I sorted it all out and made a couple of trips to my "Rumpelkammer" downstairs — an enormous storage closet — and began the task of putting things back in their place.

While I was at my task, I allowed myself to become distracted by looking through score after score of music in my library. Many of these were good old friends – like my Peters editions of Bach organ works from my early years studying in college and then in Germany. I hadn't really opened these volumes for 30 years or more since acquiring the New Bach Edition and learning about performance practice. Glancing through the pages, I found piece after piece that I had learned. The marks of former teachers filled the pages and looking at them transported me back to the times I had spent working with these instructors. Lots of legato phrasing and heel/toe pedaling marks (a sign of the times) were present but also the picturesque writing of my professors.

And so this week when I began teaching, I was perhaps more cognizant of what I was inscribing into my own students' scores. I wondered if they would have fond memories in 30 years if they happened to look at them again. And, as if by coincidence, I received an email from one of my first students here whom I taught 20 years ago. She closed her email message to me with the following words: "At the risk of appearing too sentimental, just know that if you are ever reflective on your own life, please know that you made a profound impact on mine."



## ...a Raven CD Opportunity

Calvert Johnson, editor of a new edition of the *Fiori Musicali* of Girolamo Frescobaldi (1583-1643) published in 2008 by Wayne Leupold Editions, has recorded the works for the Raven CD label. Comprising the entire set of three Masses with all of their alternate and optional movements on a 2-CD set, the recording is now available for the price of a single CD from www.RavenCD.com and the Organ Historical Society. It will be released nationally in December and in Europe in January.

Calvert Johnson bases the new edition on a source previously unknown or unused in creating performing editions. The source is a manuscript of German tablature written 1637 to 1640 and now preserved at the University of Turin. It contains all but a few pieces of the work, which was published in 1635, the last composition published during Frescobaldi's life. Johnson uses other sources as well, including the original publication. He said that the tablature was prepared by someone who possessed great musical skill and style, and opens a window on certain performance and ornamentation practices of the day.

For the recording, Johnson received a sabbatical leave from Agnes Scott University, Decatur, Georgia, where he is the Charles A. Dana Professor of Music, to Serra San Quirico, Italy, where he played the organ built in 1676 by the Roman organbuilder Giuseppe Testa at Chiesa di Santa Lucia. The organ was restored in 2007 by Andrea Pinchi of Foligno, Italy.

The *Fiori Musicali* ("Musical Flowers") include Toccatas, Ricercars, Canzonas, Capriccios, and settings of the Kyrie as arranged in three Masses with many alternative or extra compositions. When the works were published in 1635, Frescobaldi, appointed in 1608 as organist to the Vatican and St. Peter's for life, had returned the previous year to his job in Rome after a five-year hiatus in Florence during which he received the highest pay of any court musician in Italy as a member of the Medici household.

### Memoirs from 2008 Summer POE

This past July, eighteen of the best organ student's in the country, came together to study with what was probably the highest quality faculty and events ever assembled at a Pipe Organ Encounter. The week was filled with daily lessons, practice, master classes and workshops that were all catered to many advanced aspects of organ playing.

I had the opportunity to study with Paul Tegels of the Pacific Lutheran University, and worked with him on works of Bach, Mendelssohn, and Preston.

Of great interest were the three master classes. The Twentieth Century class, of which I played in, was taught by Chris Young of Indiana University. We also attended a Baroque master class with George Ritchie, and a Romantic master class with Todd Wilson.

The instruments at the POEA primarily consisted of Bedient and Reuter, but even with only two primary builders we still had multiple different styles of organ building examples. However, the Shoenstein at the First-Plymouth Congregational Church in Lincoln, and the Pasi at St. Cecilia Cathedral in Omaha, were probably the two favorites of most of the attendees.

The POEA was an excellent week spent with many of the country's best students, faculty, and instruments. It was a week enjoyed by all who attended, and many of us are looking forward to the POEA next year! I can't thank the Atlanta Chapter enough for their support in attending this wonderful even!

Thomas has studied piano since the age of seven and organ since the age of 12. His teacher is Dr. Graham Purkerson, music director at St. Jude the Apostles Church in Sandy Springs. He is currently the accompanist for the youth choir and is active with the music program at Lawrenceville's First United Methodist Church.



The reason the POE Advanced was conceived was to provide a camp where high-school students could be sure of high-level instruction rather than beginning organ. Although the usual POEs are great, this type opened a new range of possibilities. Among these were master classes and improvisation, which could not be done with new organ students.

A day at the POEA normally was begun with lessons and practice. The lessons were at a different organ every day. There were two students assigned to each teacher, so we could have a lesson for an hour then practice nearby for an hour. One of the most interesting organs that I practiced on was an 1875 Kilgan. The lessons were followed by

theory and improvisation classes. The theory classes focused on counterpoint, which was mostly new to me.

The improvisation classes were largely on hymn improvisation. After the classes, we had a tour or similar event, one (or two) master classes, and time at the console of the organ we were visiting.

We toured the Bedient organ shop, the dual-temperament organ at Saint Cecilia's Cathedral in Omaha, the Kimball theater organ in the home of an Omaha resident, the Schoenstein in Lincoln, and other organs and places. The master classes were with organists such as George Ritchie and Todd Wilson. This schedule made for a 14-hour day.

The POEA had its share of humor as well. For example: making up words to fugue subjects, "renaming" the Bedient organ company Obedient, and discussing Kiernberger III temperament as though we were unaware a newspaper reporter had come up next to us. The level of students and faculty was high, and it was encouraging to see the number of students as well. I learned more than I thought was possible in one week. As one student put it, "It's what happens when a bunch of insane organists all get together."


## Messiaen Fest at the Cathedral of St. Philip:

### WESLEYAN COLLEGE COMPLETES \$1 MILLION RESTORATION OF ITS HISTORIC 1925 ORGAN

Macon, GA - Wesleyan's Goodwyn-Candler-Panoz organ, the largest musical instrument in central Georgia, has returned to campus. The majestic 1925 instrument's \$1 million dollar restoration is complete. Wesleyan invites the community to celebrate the re-designed and expanded instrument through a dedication ceremony with **Peter Richard Conte** in concert on **Thursday, October 2, 2008 at 7:30PM**. Conte is the Grand Organist of the world-famous Wanamaker organ at Macy's Department Store in Philadelphia, home of the world's largest playing organ. The dedication event is free and open to the public!

The nearly 5,000 pipes of the Goodwyn-Candler-Panoz organ were packed in crates and sent to the Schantz Organ Co. in Orville, Ohio for repairs, cleaning, and re-voicing. The removal of the organ took ten days and the work in the organ shop was completed over the past eight months. The organ returned to Wesleyan's campus on July 14, 2008. The reinstallation took about three weeks and a team from the company stayed for an additional seven weeks voicing and tuning each pipe individually so that they sound properly in the auditorium. The largest pipe of the organ, at a height of 32 feet, is the largest single organ pipe in the mid-state.


"Wesleyan's 1925 Aeolian organ is a superb example of the American orchestral organ that was being built in the early twentieth century," according to Wesleyan College Assistant professor of Music Michael McGhee, D.M. "Organs like the

one in Porter Auditorium are rare because organ-building practices changed dramatically later in the twentieth century and many organs from the early 1900's were replaced with a different style of instrument."

Originally, Wesleyan's 72-rank Goodwyn-Candler-Panoz organ was a gift to the school by Asa Candler, Jr., the son of Coca-Cola's founder. The current \$1 million renovation project is possible through a generous donation from Nancy C. Panoz, a friend of the College who was honored in 2003 when she received an honorary doctor of commercial science.

The American Guild of Organists has designated 2008-2009 as the International Year of the Organ. Churches and music organizations across the world will offer special programs on or around Sunday, October 19, 2008 through the International Organ Spectacular. Wesleyan will play special tribute to the International Organ celebration through several events, including the dedication ceremony and concert, plus a Macon Symphony Orchestra Masterworks event with Wesleyan Organist and Assistant Professor of Music Dr. Michael McGhee on October 18, 2008 at 8PM in the Wesleyan College Porter Auditorium. This event will feature a performance of Guilmant's Symphony for Organ and Orchestra, op. 42. For information and tickets, call Macon Symphony Orchestra 301-5300.


