Per the "rules and regulations" of The Fox, this program is not open to the general public. It is only for AGO & ATOS members and their guests; therefore, making a reservation is essential! There will be two reservation lists: "Reception & Concert" and "Concert Only." It is imperative that you have your name on one of these lists in order to be admitted. Please make your reservations by *Wednesday, August 22*, or sooner. We need to provide our caterer, Roadshows, with an accurate count several days prior to the event. Reservations can be made by emailing David Barber at <u>david.barber@charter.net</u>, or online at the Atlanta AGO website (www.agoatlanta.org). (For information on how to make reservations by phone, see the bottom of page 2 of this newsletter.)

The reception is being held at **The Georgian Terrace**, directly across the street from the Fox. To help cover the food expenses of the evening, we request a \$10.00 donation from everyone who attends the reception.

For the concert, we will enter next to the STAGE DOOR, where you will be greeted by AGO & ATOS members. Do not use the main entrance under the marquee. Doors will not open before 7:00 pm. The concert is free. There will be name tags provided at the reception, so those attending the reception should have no problem entering the theatre.

Metered parking is available on Ponce and West Peachtree; and there is a paid lot on Ponce directly across from the Fox, and a paid lot on North Avenue, immediately to the south of Windsor Over Peachtree. The "loading zone" along the Fox Theatre building is NOT available for free parking.

From the Dean

Dear Friends,

This is a time for expressing gratitude. I am thankful for the opportunity to serve as your dean and I am particularly grateful for all that each one of you does to support the mission of the AGO. Together we can continue the legacy of my immediate predecessor, David Barber, and work towards greater heights in this wonderful chapter. Please join me in offering our appreciation to David for all he does for the AGO!

The most important thing we will do over the next two years is help to make the 2020 national convention as good as it can be. This is clearly where a lot of energy and resources will go. If you hold a church position, I would like to challenge you to find a way to introduce young people to the organ. You are all creative people, so amaze me with your brilliant ideas! We also need to think of ways to teach the organ to people other than children and youth (i.e., people over the age of 20 or so). As a profession, we actually need more amateur organists (people who can take small part-time jobs in rural areas where there is now a dearth of organists). You may know people who have keyboard skills but need your guidance in developing pedal technique. We all have a passion for the 'King of Instruments,' so let's see what we can do to perpetuate the tradition of great organ music!

Our former Sub-Dean, Becky Ramsey, has created a marvelous year of programming for us. Thank you, Becky! I hope you will all be able to attend the opening event at the Fox Theater on Monday, August 27. Please look for information about it in this newsletter and follow any emails regarding the event. We have a reception scheduled for 6:00 that evening with the concert beginning at 7:30. This is going to be an exciting evening that will include a rare opportunity to hear both theater and classical selections on "Mighty Mo." It's going to be a lot of fun, so don't miss it!

It's time to put all of our chapter meetings and concerts in your calendars. You can find them at the bottom of page 3 of this newsletter. We have a wonderful array of events planned, so I hope you will all be able to join us. I look forward to a great year!





On Sunday, September 23 at 4:00 p.m. in the Sanctuary of Peachtree Road United Methodist Church, organist Nicole Marane, percussionist John Lawless, and narrator John Lemley will offer a performance of Prokofiev's *Peter and the Wolf*.

One of our chapter's goals for the coming years is to increase the number of children's events so that our young people can be exposed to the organ. This performance will be an engaging way for children to hear the full potential of the organ and see how much fun it is to play. The colorfullness of the orchestral work makes it perfect for the organ. Concertgoers can clearly hear the duck played by the oboe, the bird played by the flute, the cat by the clarinet, grandfather by the bassoon and even the wolf by the low sounds of the organ. Organ Dedication Concert

Alcee Chriss, III, at Spelman College

On Friday, October 12, 2018, at 7:00 p.m. Spelman College will present Alcee Chriss, III, in the first of a series of organ recitals reinstituting the Harreld-James Organ Recital Series, begun in 2005.

Winner of the 2017 Canadian International Organ Competition, and Firmin Swinnen Silver Medalist at the 2016 Longwood Gardens International Organ Competition, Alcee Chriss III has been celebrated for his "grace, skill and abundant proficiency." Other competitions that he has won in recent years include the 2016 Fort Wayne National Organ Competition, the 2014 Miami International Organ Competition, and the Albert Schweitzer National Organ Competition and Quimby Regional Competition, both in 2013.

Organ Discovery Day at Spivey Hall

Clayton State University's Spivey Hall invites everyone curious about how a pipe organ works to discover its magnificent Albert Schweitzer Memorial Organ on Organ Discovery Day, Saturday, September 22, a free-admission, family-friendly event beginning at 3:00 p.m. and featuring live music, demonstrations, a video, refreshments, and door prizes, plus the chance to go on stage, see the organ's pipes and console, and have your questions answered by Spivey's team of organ experts.

"Spivey Hall's pipe organ combines centuries-old craftsmanship with 21st-century digital technology," said Sam Dixon, executive and artistic director of Spivey Hall. "It has thousands and thousands of parts that together can create a tremendous variety of sounds. At Organ Discovery Day, you'll come to understand what all these parts do, and how our amazing Schweitzer Memorial Organ actually works."

The visual centerpiece of Spivey's breathtaking design, the 79-rank, 3-manual, 4,413-pipe Schweitzer Memorial Organ was designed, built and installed by the Italian firm of Fratelli Ruffatti; the sonic giant stands 50 feet high and spans 37 feet wide. The organ was not in place when Spivey Hall presented its first concerts in 1991, but was always part of the vision of Spivey Hall founders Walter and Emilie Spivey; in addition to her generous philanthropy, Emilie was an accomplished church organist and friend of famed organist Virgil Fox. Specifically designed as a concert organ (as opposed to a church or theatre organ) and custom built in Padua, it was then disassembled, shipped and reassembled at Spivey between November 1991 and April 1992. Tonal adjustments continued right up until its official dedication in May of 1992.

Conceived to engage audience members of all ages, Organ Discovery Day was first presented two years ago to launch 25th-anniversary celebrations of the Schweitzer Memorial Organ, and returns by popular demand. Organ Discovery Day is once again hosted by Spivey Organist-in-Residence Alan Morrison along with Spivey's organ curator, Tommy McCook of Widener and Company, and Integrated Organ Technologies, Inc. founder and president Dr. Dwight Jones. All three are featured in Spivey Hall Education's three-part educational video, The King of Instruments: History, Science and Music of the Pipe Organ, which will be screened at the event. The multiple-award-winning video was launched in 2016 for online distance education use in school classrooms, and provides an informative, engaging and entertaining overview of the organ. Following the screening, all three hosts will participate in an audience Q&A and allow audience members the chance to come on stage to see the organ console and pipes up-close.

Morrison will also treat the audience members to a live performance that demonstrates the amazing sounds the organ makes. The afternoon ends with door prizes and complimentary refreshments in the lobby.

In addition to serving as Spivey's organist-in-residence since 2016, Morrison holds the McGehee Family Organist Residency, made possible with financial support from Spivey Hall Friends Shelley, Terry and Linda McGehee. He also holds the Haas Charitable Trust Chair in Organ Studies at Philadelphia's prestigious Curtis Institute of Music, joined the faculty of Westminster Choir College of Rider University in 2006, and serves as College Organist at Ursinus College in Collegeville, Pennsylvania.

The afternoon event introduces audiences to the 28th Season Organ Series. Morrison opens the series with a recital on October 27, with a program featuring Russian Romantic composer Modest Mussorgsky's colorful Pictures at an Exhibition performed with art image projections. Following later in the season is self-titled Boston-based "sonic artist" Peter Edwin Krasinski (February 23), who will deploy his powers of musical imagination and deft dramatic timing to accompany a big-screen presentation of Harold Lloyd's 1928 silent comedy. SPEEDY (which includes a cameo appearance by baseball legend Babe Ruth). Morrison returns to the Spivey stage on March 16 with the principal trumpet of the New York Philharmonic, Christopher Martin. The two are native Atlantans and Martin was previously principal trumpet of the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra. Both Nathan Laube (April 7) and Ahreum Han (May 4) were rising stars when they debuted at Spivey Hall in past years; this season, they each return to Spivey as internationally renowned artists.

For organ fans, Spivey Hall offers a \$100 Season 28 Organ Pass, providing deeply discounted admission to all five Season 28 organ performances. Organ Passes are transferable, enabling the pass to be used by someone else if the purchaser's plans change, and are available only until October 27.
